#### **FALL 1998 ENROLLMENT SUMMARY**

The following report summarizes the status and trends in fall enrollment at the University of Missouri's four campuses. Enrollments are presented in a series of six tables. The first table summarizes the fall total headcount enrollments for each campus and the System since 1994. The second table displays fall 1998 enrollments by campus, student level, and characteristics such as residency, full- and part-time status, and student full-time equivalency. Following the first two summary tables are a series of tables displaying more detailed enrollment and student characteristics for the System and each individual campus. Tables 3.0-3.4 depict on-campus and off-campus headcount and full-time equivalency enrollments as well as student credit hours by student level. On-campus and off-campus enrollments by residency, full- and part-time status, and student level are shown in Tables 4.0-4.4. Table 5.0 shows enrollments by student level, gender, and ethnic characteristics, and Table 6.0 displays UMKC headcount enrollment in its six-year dentistry and medicine programs.

#### **Technical Notes**

These tables provide counts of students enrolled in the fall 1998 on-schedule credit courses of the four campuses of the University of Missouri. Fall 1997 counts are included in the Table 3 series (3.0-3.4) for comparison purposes. The data included in these tables were prepared in the admissions and registration offices at the respective campuses. The data are counts as of the census data at each campus which is defined as the end of the fourth week of classes for the fall session. The reports were generally based on the reporting guidelines and definitions of the Coordinating Board for Higher Education (CBHE) and the National Center for Educational Statistics (NCES).

Each of the tables in the Table 3 and Table 4 series include counts of on- and off-campus students. The columns titled "On-Campus", according to the CBHE guidelines, include students enrolled geographically on campus and students in the Graduate Engineering (Residence) Centers. All other students are counted in the columns headed "Off-Campus". The tables of the Table 3 series also include full-time equivalence (FTE) counts. FTE is defined as 15 semester credit hours for undergraduates and 12 semester credit hours for graduates. For professional programs, FTE is defined as 15 semester hours for Law, 18 for UM Columbia Medicine, and 16 for Veterinary Medicine. For Dentistry, UMKC Medicine, Optometry, and Pharmacy, FTE is equal to headcount.

#### Caveats

First- and second-year students in the Dentistry DDS and Medicine MD programs at UMKC are included in the undergraduate counts of the Table 3 and Table 4 series. For this reason, headcount enrollments for students at all years in these two programs are summarized in Table 6. Enrollment counts for students in "Off-Schedule" courses, which include intersession courses, short courses, Video Credit courses, and other courses which begin and end on dates other than those for the regular academic semester, are accumulated during the term in which the courses began and are reported the semester following their end date.

#### Tables 1 and 2: Fall Enrollment History and Summary of Fall 1998 Enrollments

- The University of Missouri had a total enrollment of 54,189 in fall 1998, up 1% from fall 1997 and up 2% from fall 1994.
- UM-Kansas City and UM-Rolla have experienced the largest percentage changes in fall enrollment over the past five years. UMKC has seen a 7% increase in total enrollment, while UMR has seen a 12% decrease since 1994. Total enrollments at UM-Columbia and UM-St. Louis have remained fairly steady over the past five years, with increases of 3% and 2% respectively.
- Total enrollments at UM-Columbia and UM-Kansas City have increased each of the last five years, while UM-Rolla's total enrollment has declined each of the last five years. Total enrollment at UM-St. Louis increased in fall 1998, recovering from its first decrease in five years in 1997.
- UM-Columbia enrolled 42% (22,780 students) of total students at the University of Missouri, UM-St. Louis 29% (15,880 students), UM-Kansas City 20% (10,611 students), and UM-Rolla 9% (4,918 students).
- The University of Missouri enrolled 41,052 undergraduate students (76%), 2,613 first professional students (5%), and 10,524 graduate students (19%).
- Eighty-two percent of all students enrolled at the University are Missouri residents.
- Of the 54,189 students enrolled System-wide, 65% are full-time students.

# Table 3.0: UM System - Headcounts, Full-Time Equivalence, and Student Credit Hours

- Total headcount enrollment at the University increased 1% from 53,547 in fall 1997 to 54,189 in fall 1998.
- Undergraduate and first professional enrollments each increased 2% over fall 1997. Graduate enrollment declined 2%, due mainly to a decrease of 251 students (3%) at the masters level.

# Table 3.1: UM-Columbia - Headcounts, Full-Time Equivalence, and Student Credit Hours

- Total headcount enrollment at UM-Columbia increased 1% (228 students) from 22,552 in fall 1997 to 22,780 in fall 1998.
- Although the total number of degree seeking freshmen and sophomores decreased by 1% (46 students), the number of first-time degree seeking freshmen increased by 295 students, a gain of 8% over fall 1997.
- Graduate level enrollment declined in all categories: masters, doctoral and nondegree seeking headcount enrollments, first-time graduate students, FTE enrollment, and SCH produced.
- FTE enrollment and SCH produced each increased 2% over fall 1997.

- Total headcount enrollment at UM-Kansas City was 10,611 in fall 1998, a 2% increase over the total of 10,444 in fall 1997. FTE enrollment rose by 2% during the last year.
- Undergraduate and first professional enrollment increased 3% and 4%, respectively. Graduate enrollment declined 2%.

# Table 3.3: UM-Rolla - Headcounts, Full-Time Equivalence, and Student Credit Hours

- Total headcount enrollment at UM-Rolla decreased from 4,976 students in fall 1997 to 4,918 students in fall 1998, a decline of 1%.
- The number of first-time degree seeking freshmen increased 4% (27 students) over fall 1997.
- At the graduate level, enrollment declined 1%. Masters level enrollment declined by 32 students (6%), while enrollment at the doctoral level made a gain of 25 students or 9% over fall 1997.
- FTE enrollment and SCH produced remained nearly the same as fall 1997.

# Table 4.0: UM System - Full-time, Part-time, Resident, and Nonresident Students

- Sixty-five percent of all students enrolled at the University of Missouri are full-time students.
- Undergraduate students in the lower division have a full-time enrollment of 90%. The percentage of upper division undergraduates enrolled full-time is 72%. Overall, 70% of undergraduates are enrolled full-time.
- Ninety-eight percent of first professional students are enrolled full-time, with all students in dentistry, medicine, optometry, pharmacy, and veterinary medicine enrolled full-time.
- Graduate students are the most likely group to be part-time and non-resident. Part-time students comprise 65% of the graduate student level, and 34% are non-residents.
- At the undergraduate level, 87% of students are Missouri residents. Eighty-one percent of first professional students are residents of Missouri.

- Of the four campuses, UM-Columbia has the highest proportion of full-time students (85%).
- At the undergraduate level 92% of students are full-time, compared to 99% at the first professional level and 49% at the graduate level.
- Eighty-three percent of all students are residents of Missouri. First professional students have the highest percentage of Missouri residents (95%). Residents comprise 87% of the undergraduate students and 63% of the graduate level.
- Full-time Missouri residents totaled 16,147 and were 71% of all students enrolled.

- Full-time students at UM-Kansas City numbered 5,957 or 56% of the total. At the undergraduate level, 63% of students are enrolled full-time, compared to 28% at the graduate level.
- Ninety-seven percent of UMKC's 1,272 first professional students are enrolled full-time. Law is the only first professional area with students enrolled part-time.
- Missouri residents account for 72% of the total enrollment. The highest percentage of Missouri residents is at the undergraduate level (78%). The first professional level and graduate level contain 72% and 58% Missouri residents, respectively.

- Eighty-three percent of students at UM-Rolla are enrolled full-time. Full-time enrollment at the undergraduate level is 88%, while at the graduate level it is 61%.
- UM-Rolla has the highest percentage of non-residents among the four campuses (33%).
- Missouri residents comprise 73% of the total undergraduate enrollment, compared to only 39% at the graduate level.

- UM-St. Louis has the lowest percentage of full-time students (36%) and the highest proportion of Missouri residents (94%) among the four campuses.
- At the undergraduate level, 71% of degree seeking freshmen and sophomores are enrolled full-time, compared to 48% of degree seeking juniors and seniors. Only 15% of graduate students are enrolled full-time.
- Ninety-five percent of undergraduates at UM-St. Louis are Missouri residents, while 88% of graduate students are residents. Of the 173 first professional students, 51% are residents of Missouri.
- UM-St. Louis has a higher number of students enrolled off-campus than the other four campuses. Part-time off-campus enrollment equaled 3,711 or 23% of total enrollment.

- Total enrollment at the University of Missouri consists of 53% women and 47% men. UM-St. Louis has the largest percentage of women (62%), and UM-Rolla has the highest proportion of men (76%).
- The first professional level has a higher proportion of men, while students at the undergraduate and graduate levels are more likely to be women.
- Under-represented minorities (American Indian/Alaskan Native, African-American, and Hispanic) represent 10.6% of the University of Missouri's total enrollment. UM-St. Louis enrolls the largest proportion (13.7%) followed by UM-Kansas City (13.4%), UM-Columbia (8.4%), and UM-Rolla (5.1%).
- UM-St. Louis has an African-American enrollment of 1,889 students, 12.3% of its total, and the largest percentage among the four campuses.
- UM-Kansas City enrolls higher percentages of Asian/Pacific Islanders and Hispanics, 5.6% and 3.2% respectively, than the other four campuses.
- Although nonresident aliens comprise only 5.2% of total enrollment at the University of Missouri, they represent 16.8% of the total graduate enrollment. UM-Rolla enrolls the largest percentage of nonresident alien graduate students (44.2%), followed by UM-Columbia (20.5%), UM-Kansas City (13.8%), and UM-St. Louis (5.5%).
